I was born in America on the 16th of May 1992 in Newburyport, Massachusetts. After about three months we moved to Killarney. We lived in Lissivigeen for two years. After that we moved into town. We stayed there for five years until I finished 'Senior Infants' in Loreto.

We then had to move to Israel due to my Dad's work. We lived in Jerusalem for four years. My many memories include: swimming in the Dead Sea in August (the hottest month of the year), sunrise over the Mt. of

Olives, snorkelling in the Red Sea coral and many trips to the Old City, not to mention seeing the pyramid and experiencing a bomb going off right next to my school.

At the end of the fourth year, that was 2003 we were forced to go on evacuation, meaning we had to leave the country immediately, because of the Iraq war. We went to Washington D.C. where my Dad's work is based. We stayed there for eleven weeks not knowing when we would be allowed back. Our dog was in a kennels for about 100 days. On Easter week the American government said we could go back.

That July we moved down to Africa, to a country called Botswana, directly north of South Africa. We went on many safaris and we saw countless animals including elephants, lions, crocodiles and many antelopes. During my time there I visited both Zimbabwe and South Africa. In both countries I went to an international school.

We stayed there for a year and then we decided to move back to Ireland. That was in May 2004. I started school here in the last two weeks of term of 5th class and rejoined the classmates I had left in 1999. There were many changes in the school and my friends had grown – a lot. I was very happy to be welcomed back into my old school.

Ross Castle

After finishing our nature day in Knockreer we walked across the National Park to Ross Castle. We had a guided tour, which was very interesting. Our guide's name was Claudia. She told us that Ross Castle was built in the 15th century. It was built by O'Donoghue of Ross. It stands on a peninsula, which extends into Lough Leane. It was built by the Earl of Desmond Rory O'Donoghue. Ross Castle is a Tower house. It was used as a defence building. It was the last castle to fall in the Cromwellion Rebellion in 1652. About 15 people slept In the Guards' room. The windows had a narrow slit because if they were big they would be attacked easily and it was easier to stick your gun out through a narrow window. The stairs were built in a clockwise direction because a lot of soldiers were right handed. This gave an advantage to the defenders. They could swing their swords coming down the stairs.

In the guardroom there is a musket Loophole for the guards' guns to fit out and kill the opposition. There is a murder hole on the second floor just above the main entrance. It was a little hole that they used to throw down hot oil, tar or hot water to kill the opposition trying to come in.

In the parlour they had very good delicate furniture. The lights were made of rushes covered in animal fat. Some of them were made out of bees wax but not very often because they cost too much.

The toilet was just a ledge with a pit at the bottom where all the waste went. It was very rarely cleaned out because the ammonia gases disinfected the clothes. This is why the toile was known as the Guarde robe (French for – protecting clothes).

In the bedroom the baby slept in a cradle or a cubbyhole to keep him/her safe from rats. The chieftain's bed was made of wood. In the Great Hall there is a big window which wasn't there before for defence reasons. They had a fireplace in that room.

The Brownes burned the roof of the castle because they didn't want to pay taxes. It was a ruin for many years. John Mc Shain wanted to keep it as a historic feature so he brought out a consortium of business people. In 1970 it was taken over by the state. Extensive structural repair and restoration have taken place. It is now managed by Duchas and is open to the public.

The tsunami

This is how it all began. On the 26th of December 2004, there was a terrible catastrophe. The earthquake behind the tsunami which swamped parts of Asia was caused by sudden, violent slippage of a 1,200 km long fault line running under the Indian ocean. The fault between the Indian and Burma platesmoved just 15 metres causing the most powerful quake in 40 years. Buildings, schools, hospitals and hotels collapsed to the ground. It will take a long time and a lot of money to rebuild the towns and villages. The devastation was unthinkable. Animals ran up to the mountains when they felt

near danger. People started following the animals to safety. The worst places affected are Sri lanka, parts of Thailand and Indonesia which are very popular tourist spots. At one point 5 million people lacked basic survival needs. Parents, children, friends and relatives turned out to identify pictures of their loved ones so that they could rest in peace.

People were very generous in Ireland and all the charitable organisations were overwhelmed with the contributions.

In our school we decided to give money from our own pocket money to help the victims. We raised €1000 which we presented to Fr. Finbarr Buckley who was going directly to a school in

Tamil Nadu in Indonesia. Half the teachers and pupils were lost in the disaster.

Doctors, nurses, builders, relatives and friends, flew out to the affected areas and helped the poor unfortunate victims in whatever way they could. People had to go around and look for their loved ones in body bags. It is absolutely heartbreaking for them. Many people may get diseases from dead bodies and the contaminated water.

We hope and pray that this terrible thing will never happen again. Please God there will be a good warning system so that plenty of notice could be given when and if a tsunami is approaching.
