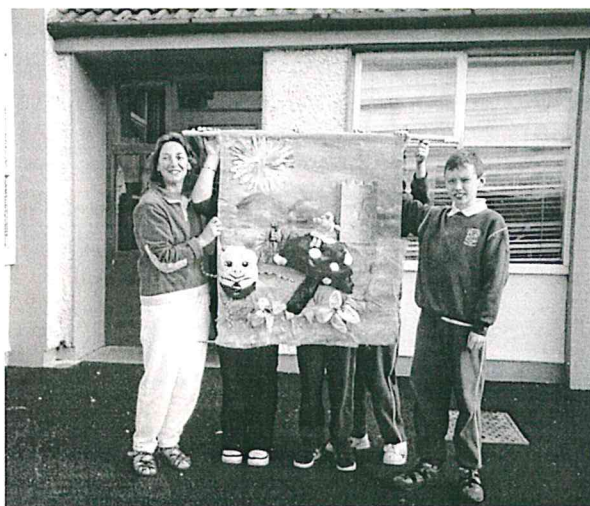
lake was very shallow , so we had to get out to let the boat go under the Old Weir Bridge.

Mr Murphy does fourteen readings a day.

Muckross has been recording since 1943. We read the temperature for the 26th May. It was 15 degrees.



We discovered that there were three soil thermometers in the weather station. One went 50cm into the earth, the second 100cm and the third 120cm. We discovered the further down into the earth the colder it got.

We saw the rain gauge which measures the rain fall every day. The gauge was empty on the 27th of May because there was no rain on the 26th. The gauge was a cylinder shape. We also saw the evaporation tank. It tells us how much water is soaked up by wind and sun every day.

Then after lunch we went down to the river with sieves where I found a fish about an inch long, Killian Buckley found a fish egg that was

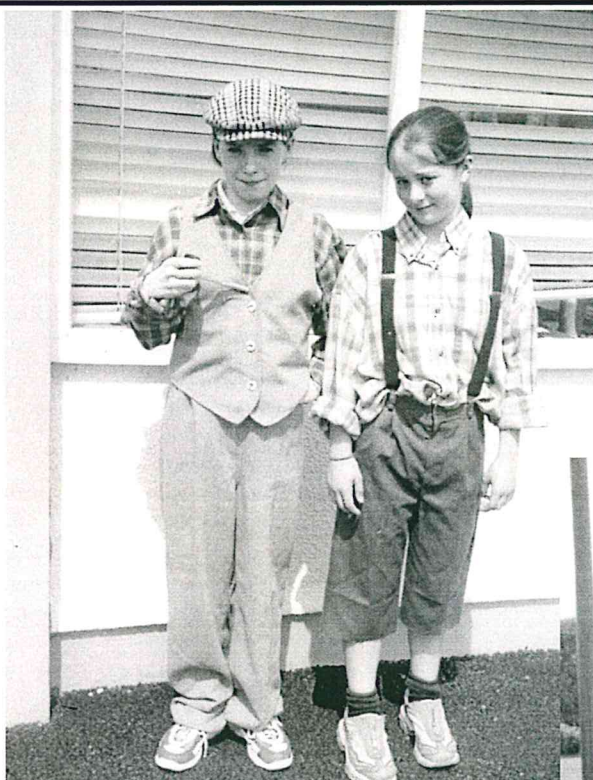
