History project on Loreto Sisters


This year instead of doing our own individual history projects we had to do one big project that all the school contributed to. Our project was called: "The History of Loreto Sisters".

Pat O'Shea trained 4th, 5th and 6th classes in football. He visited our school every monday morning from 9.30 to 10.30.


He taught us all the skills - soloing, passing, long kicks and defending. we also had games of dodge ball and games of football.

Autumn is the rutting season which means the mating season. The stags fight and break their antlers sometimes. Deer shed their antlers in late spring and re-growth starts in early summer.

The points of the antlers are called "Tynes". Baby calves are born and tagged in June. The slide show was very interesting.



Book Preview of James Cameron's "Titanic"


James Cameron's "Titanic" chronicles the cinematic re-creation of the most legendary ocean disaster of all time as seen through the eye of a master storyteller.

We found that in our school that swimming and reading were liked best.


In second place was cycling and in third was football. Fifteen pupils liked knitting best. There are many different types of hobbies that the pupils in our school enjoy.

Monica Brown is an Australian singer. She came to Killarney in October 1997.



The play explored the relationships between selfesteem and the need to feel part of the gang, it did this through music, song and a dramatic story.



If the level of water drops the water must be added, if it rises above, water must be drained off. It is through this evaporation by wind and sun is measured. Then they send the records to Glasnevin in Dublin.

We saw soil thermometers. The first thermometer we saw was one foot down in the earth and the temperature was 13.5, the next thermometer was two feet down and the temperature was the same as the first thermometer. The last thermometer we saw was four feet down and the temperature was 15.5.
