On Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> May 2006 Michael Lagan (4<sup>th</sup> class), Elizabeth Fuller (5<sup>th</sup> class) Mary Fuller (parent) and Ms. O' Connell travelled by train to Dublin to attend the Green Flag Ceremony.

Before the ceremony, we had a marvellous opportunity to visit the G.P.O. (Gereral Post Office) and Trinity College. There we saw the famous Book of Kells written by the monks in the 6<sup>th</sup> Century. We were all very impressed with the ornate decorations on each page. We then took a taxi to the ceremony.

The ceremony was held in An Taisce headquarters in Taylor's Hall from 1p.m. to 3p.m. The V.I.P.guest speaker was Mr. Batt O' Keeffe, the Junior Minister for the Environment and he presented each school with a Green School Flag and Certificate.

There were pupils from Co. Kerry, Co. Cork and Co. Waterford present at the award ceremony. In all, there were seven schools from Co. Kerry receiving Green School Flags for the first time. We were very proud to be one of these seven schools.

After the ceremony we went shopping to St. Stephen's Green Shopping Centre and we got the last train to Kerry at 6.30p.m. Although we were exhausted on the journey home we still had lots of fun and chat.

On Friday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2006 three local Kerry footballers Colm Cooper, Eoin Brosnan and Kieran Cremin, will help hoist the tricolour (The Irish Flag), the Kerry flag and the Green Schools flag. We hope that there will be a large crowd present to witness this historic occasion.

#### REDUCE REUSE RECYCLE-MAKING A DIFFERENCE TOGETHER!!!!

The theme of our first Green Schools flag was litter, waste and recycling. The Green School committee met the last Wednesday of every month in the school prefab and decided on the school's action plans.

#### WASTE:

The 6<sup>th</sup> class pupils were responsible for carrying out a waste survey. They discovered that the school had two waste bins and two recycling bins. They also investigated the contents of the four school bins. They found that there was a lot of food & fruit scraps thrown in to the bin. They also found that a lot of our waste could be recycled-especially plastics and cartons.

The school decided to purchase a Green Cone to cater for fruit skins and cores and this was placed in the tree garden. Each class also started to sort their waste and our secretary, Margaret, organised three bins for each classroom- a recycling bin, a waste bin and a bin for the bruscar glas. All classes began to recycle their plastic bottles and drink cartons. Some children brought their lunch in reusable air tight containers and placed their drinks in re-sealable bottles. All of these changes helped to reduce the school's waste.

#### LITTER;

All classes carried out litter surveys in different areas in the school at different times during the school day. These surveys were carried out in October 2005 and again in February 2006. The first survey showed that disposable wrappers from taytos, popcorn and sweets were causing a lot of the school's litter.

In order to reduce litter, a Ballot on a Healthy Eating & Anti- Litter Proposal was held in December and the majority of families voted in favour of the proposal. Sweets, taytos, popcorn and bars were now only allowed in school on special occasions. Litter busters were also set up from each class and the school held an Anti-Litter colouring and poster competition before Christmas. The winners received a selection box from Nestlé as a prize.

#### RECYCLING:

The school started recycling old mobile phones, old print cartridges and old batteries. Some pupils designed special recycling posters and Ms. O' Connell stuck them up in local shops in the community These posters encouraged the community to support Scoil Bhríde's recycling campaigns.

#### CARING FOR THE ENVIRONMENT SHIELD:

The Doyle Family of Elyod House Ross Road, kindly donated a Caring for the Environment Shield to the school. This shield is dedicated to the memory of Mrs. Margaret Lynch R.I.P. (Caoimhe & Aisling Doyle's Granny) and it encourages the children to be eco-friendly. The winners from each class will be announced at the Flag Raising Ceremony. Each winner will receive a certificate and will take the shield home for one week.

#### OUR ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE:

By February '06 the school had achieved all its targets.

- 1) The School waste going to the local land fill was reduced by 50%. We now only have one recycling bin and one waste bin.
- 2) The school also saved E350 from its annual waste bill.
- 3) The litter around the school grounds fell from 373-240 pieces.
- 4) Most of the pupils in the school are bringing healthy lunches to school now.
- 5) A lot of parents commented that their children were also recycling and re-using at home!!!!

Michael Ó Coilleáin visited the school in May and he was very impressed at the amount we had achieved in such a short time. A week later a letter arrived from an Taisce with the good news. WE HAD ACHIEVED OUR FIRST GREEN FLAG!! Everyone was delighted and relieved. WE DID IT!!! Each class had homework off that night to celebrate the good news. FANTASTIC!!!!

## Knockreer House and Ross Castle

On Thursday the 6<sup>th</sup> of April, fifth and sixth class went to Knockreer House and Gardens and Ross Castle for a Science Day. We met at the main gates of Knockreer at (9.30a.m, and walked to Knockreer House, where we met the Scientists Chris and Catherine.



Catherine had hidden six Mammal Traps in the ditch. When we found them we opened them. Four were empty but two had creatures in them. One was a bank vole, the other was a wood mouse. We learned that the bank vole is diurnal. It has small eyes and reddish brown skin. It has a short tail and is very tame. It is not a native mouse, but people may have brought them from other countries. The wood mouse is nocturnal and has big eyes. Its fur is dark brown and it has a long tail for balance when climbing. It also has big ears for hearing its predator coming for its dinner. The wood mouse is a native mouse.

Next we went down to the river to study Water Ecology. We waded into the water with our sieves to try and catch water insects, such as the stonefly, leech, mayfly, nymph, larvae and the fresh water shrimp. The creatures we found indicated that the water is clean and unpolluted. Biologists call these the indicator species. When we caught the insects we picked them out and put them in a tray. Afterwards we put the insects back in the water and went back to Knockreer House for lunch.

After lunch we went back out to the garden with pooters to catch insects. When we caught the insects we went upstairs in Knockreer House where the microscopes and stuffed animals were. We each got a Knockreer Science Exercise Book. We put our insects under the microscopes, taking note of the wings, eyes and legs. Afterwards we were asked to draw our insect in the Exercise Books and answer questions about them.

After a while, we set off for Ross Castle, picking up any rubbish we saw on the way. We were shocked to see all the rubbish there was. When we arrived there we met our tour guide. We visited the living room for the chieftain and his family. In the room there was a big fireplace the furniture was three hundred and fifty years old and made of oak. Rushes were dipped in animal fat and burned at both ends to make tour guide who gave us our tour. Ross castle was built in the 15th century by the O' Donoghues of Ross. The windows are very narrow to make it hard to shoot in but easy to shoot out. Ross castle is a tower house. Tower houses were built for chieftains to protect themselves. The musket loophole points at the entrance door so that guards could fire at people entering. The staircase goes clockwise to the second guardroom. This gives the advantage to the defender.

We saw the Murder Hole where the chieftain could throw down rocks. We saw the Justice Room where the chieftain settled disagreements and sorted out his taxes. After that we moved on to the bedchamber. There was one bed and a low settle bed for children. The others had only a rush mattress on the floor to sleep on. There was no glass on the windows and it was very damp. Next we saw the toilet. It was also used for hanging clothes. The gases from the waste would kill off any lice. You could call this chemical dry cleaning!

Then we saw the banquet hall. They ate from pewter plates. Pewter is a mixture of tin and lead which when polished looked like silver. Unfortunately many people were poisoned from the lead. From the



window we could see Prison Island or O' Donoghues Rock. That is where troublemakers were left. They could not swim away because nobody could swim. There were two tapestries in the hall, one French and one Flemish. They were status symbols to show off to guests. Upstairs was the Minstral's Gallery. It was a room looking down on the banquet hall where music was played for the guests.

We learned so much about Knockreer and Ross Castle. It was a very interesting day. We would love to go again.


Mrs O'Sullivan gave a trial quiz to the under thirteen age group and the following represented

## The Life Education Bus.

The Life Education Bus visited our school on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> and Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> January. We looked forward to the visit. The Educator was Seamus Whitty. He was very informative in an enjoyable way. The Life Education Bus is a travelling classroom it is equipped with state of the art technology. The lights are switched on by a remote control. There is a video showing us the importance of having a backbone and knowing who our friends really are.



We learned that the nervous system sends messages from all parts of our body to the brain. We also learned that the digestive system is about the journey of food and drink in the body. The third system that we learned about was the Respiratory system. The Respiratory system is how the body takes in air.

The final system we learned about was the circulatory system. The circulatory system helps the blood to flow around our bodies through our veins and back to our hearts.

We learned that everything we eat drink and inhale affects our brain. We learned that legal drugs kill more people in a year than illegal drugs. Legal drugs include alcohol and tobacco. People take drugs for different reasons.

Sometimes young people might be anxious about difficulties in their lives. The pressure of exams, illness and trouble at home might lead them to take drugs. The most common reason for young people experimenting with drugs is peer pressure. The messages to the brain changes when a person takes drugs and this causes confusion and a change of personality. The risks one take when one gets involved with substance abuse include damage to the brain and body.

We all need skills to cope with peer pressure. We need confidence to stand up and have a strong back-bone in resisting the temptation of taking drugs. We need to be assertive in saying "no" and to have the skills to make wise and safe decisions in the future.

We really enjoyed Seamus's visit to our school in the Life Education Bus and we learned a lot.



We will be going to Derrynane pier where Miss Helen Wilson will meet us. We will be taking part in many water sports.


